NEW FIVE-O COLLECTIBLES

An item in *The Hollywood Reporter* sent in by Paul Coyle said that a company called American Needle (of Buffalo Grove, Illinois) would be marketing baseball caps carrying logos of old television series, including *Hawaii Five-O*. I called the Jacksonville Public Library reference department and got the address for American Needle. I wrote to them, telling them about the Irregulars and asking about the hats.

In return, I got their catalog.

We should be proud that the first display splash in the catalog shows the Hawaii Five-O hats in a two-page spread! The Five-O hats are white with teal bills, and there are four styles: The Wave, or portraits (McGarrett, Danny, or Chin Ho). The portraits are in satin stitching, very dense, professionally done. The three styles with portraits on the front also have The Wave on the right side. The Danny hat has "Dano" (yeah, it's misspelled) on the back in 1.5" letters (teal with gold border); the hat with Chin's portrait on the front has "Chin Ho" on the back; and the McGarrett hat doesn't have his name on the back — it has (what else?) "Book 'Em, Dano".

The company also sent me a sample hat (being a fan club pres. does have its perks, I guess) and it is sharp! I don't know how their promotions department knew

that I'm a McGarrett fan, but that's the one they sent.

We can order these hats! The price will be \$14, including shipping (but not including, for Florida residents, sales tax. THE EAGLE EYE

REQUIEM FOR A SADDLE BRONC RIDER

Episode 212 March 24, 1977 Production No. 0615 (Summary prepared by Reg Jones)

Susie Wanane (Victoria Racimo), fresh from the Berkeley campus, visits Steve McGarrett and expresses concern about her brother, Billie (Al Lupaka), a saddle bronc rider who has disappeared. Steve and Susie drop by the rodeo grounds where they talk with Jessup (George DiCenzo), the head wrangler. He reports that Billie, a bit of a wild man, left the rodeo several days ago. When the pair talk with Calvin (Nicholas Hammond), Billie's best friend, his manner is evasive. After Susie and Steve leave, Jessup reminds Calvin to stick to the story that Billie left.

Billie had a girl friend named Lani Kapali'i (Audrey Meyers). Steve visits the Kapali'i home and learns that Lani is missing, too. She has been gone as long as Billie. In fact, she hopped a bus to meet him. Chin Ho checks with the bus driver and finds out that Lani got off near the rodeo grounds.

The next day, swimmers find the body of Lani. A further search reveals Billie's body. Word comes through that Billie and Lani had been married the day they were killed and that the bus driver dropped Lani off at the rodeo grounds. Susie tells Calvin, who then confronts Jessup. He understands why they had to cover up Billie's death, but what happened to Lani? Jessup explains that when he was loading Billie's body on the buckboard to haul it away, Lani saw him. So he killed her and threw both bodies off the cliff into the ocean.

Outraged, Calvin attacks Jessup, who beats him to the floor and is about to shoot him when McGarrett and Danny arrive. Steve helps Calvin while Danny tracks Jessup. From Calvin, McGarrett learns that the rodeo hands had been celebrating Billie's marriage when Billie became overly boastful about his courage. This upset Jessup, who had been badly injured by a Brahma bull that Billie claimed he alone could handle. Jessup and the boys searched for a red cape so Billie could fight Mexican style. When they couldn't find one, they covered Billie with red paint and threw him into the corral, where he was gored by the bull and died.

Joining Danny in the hunt for Jessup, Steve manages to seriously wound him, but the pair are too late to take Jessup alive. The cowardly rodeo clown, who overheard what happened that fatal night, had released the bull into the corral where Jessup was hiding. He explains his actions this way: "He needed dyin'"

NOTE: Although this episode opened with bodies being dumped off a cliff, it sidestepped into a Five-O planning session to crack down on cock fighting and money laundering, a matter which was never mentioned again. Anyhow, it was fun to see Nicholas Hammond in the indecisive role of Calvin. The following year he would play the lead in *The Amazing Spider-Man* series.

LITERATE FIVE-O

Once Upon a Time (#19-20) -- When McGarrett confronts Dr. C. L. Fremont (Joanne Linville), the quack who is bleeding Steve's sister Maryann (Nancy Malone), he knows Maryann has told Fremont he's on his way. "My sister did the Paul Revere bit," he says. "Yes," replies Dr. Fremont. "The cops are coming...." Paul Revere (1735-1818) was a Massachusetts silversmith who was the principal rider for the Committee of Safety. On the night of April 18, 1776, he was one of three riders who set out to warn the colonial militia that "The British are coming!" Revere didn't complete his ride; he was detained by the British. William Dawes did get through. Revere, though, was the one immortalized in William Wadsworth Longfellow's poem "The Midnight Ride of Paul Revere," which made the cry "The British are coming!" part of the American folk lexicon.

GOOD NEWS, BAD NEWS II

MacArthur elected director

EL CAJON, Calif. — James MacArthur of Palm Desert, Calif., and Honolulu, Hawaii, has been elected a director of Kendell Communications, a California media company owned by two Columbia County residents.

MacArthur's wife is the former Helen Beth "H.B." Duntz of Claver-

MacArthur, 56, is best known for his role as "Danno" in the popular television series, "Hawaii Five-0." He has appeared in many motion pictures, including "Swiss Family Robinson," "Battle of the Bulge" and "Third Man on the Mountain."

Besides "Hawaii Five-0," his TV credits include appearances on "Love Boat," "The Untouchables," "Fantasy Island" and "Wagon Train," among others. He also has appeared in many stage plays throughout the United States.

His mother was Helen Hayes, the movie, theater and TV actress who died last year. His father, Charles MacArthur, was a newspaper reporter and playwright best known for the play, "The Front Page."

He was born and raised in Nyack, and attended Harvard University.

Kendell Communications is a diversified media company that includes "The Daily Californian," a 25,000-circulation daily newspaper near San Diego, and "Senior World Newsmagazine," a monthly senior publication covering the five southernmost coun-

ties in California.

Kendell describes "Senior World. Newsmagazine" as the largest privately owned senior publication in the United States. Kendell also publishes "Antiques & Collectables," a 25,000-circulation monthly covering southern California; and the company operates a large commercial printing division.

MacArthur is developing a weekly TV program, "Senior World TV Newsmagazine," expected to be on broadcast and cable channels by fall. The TV program is expected to expand to a cable channel devoted exclusively to senior programming.

Kendell Communications is owned by Raymond Kennedy of Hudson and Paul Zindell of Claverack and LaJolla, The Kokua List -- Mahalo nui loa to Deb Doran, Reg Jones, and Richard T. O'Connor!

Film Classics release of Edward Leven productions. Stars Keith Andes, Rita Colton, Jack Lord. Directed by Edward J. Montagne, Screenplay, Gene Hurley, Earl Kennedy; added dialog, Joyce Selznick, Mitchell Johnson; camera, Don Malkames; editor, Theodore Waldeyer, reviewed Oct. 31, '49. Running time, 62 mins.

'Project X' is strictly for the minor situations that may gie it fill-in bookings. Independently produced in New York for Film Classics release, picture lacks the fundamentals and rates unimportantly, in line with its obviously low budget.

A wordy script by Gene Hurley and Barl Kennedy, further burdened by added dialog by Joyce Selznick and Mitchell Johnson, talks its way through a long 62 minutes of static action. Pic concerns an ex-commic joining forces with Federal agents to wipe out a red gang attempting to steal atomic secrets.

The Edward Leven production makes much use of the New York scene without achieving anything out of the ordinary, and the camera work by Don Malkames is spotty. Heading up the cast but doing very little with the material are Keith Andes, Rita Colton, and Jack Lord.
