AL HARRINGTON ON SCREEN AGAIN!

Al "Ben Kokua" Harrington hasn't stayed retired, though he's been spending the last couple years in Utah working on business and a book. But, as *Honolulu* magazine reported in its June 1994 issue (sent in by Robert Sandla -- thanks, Bob!), Harrington has gotten back into harness again:

ANOTHER FEATHER IN HIS CAP

Al Harrington always seens to be in the right place at the right time. When he was 3, his mother brought him from Pago Pago to Honolulu, where he attended Punahou and became Hawaii'i's first high school All-American in football. At Stanford, he was in the backfield taking handoffs from quarterback John Brodie. Returning to Punahou to teach, he soon shifted to the booming Waikiki entertainment scene and became a headliner.

In '92, sensing the tourism slowdown, he closed his show and moved to Utah, where he had in-laws. "It was time for a change," he says. Today, Harrington is the co-star of the Disney hit White Fang 2, playing a Haida Indian chief.

How did he get the job?

"I was researching a book and counseling kids at BYU. One day Disney Studios called the Native American placement office, looking for an actor to play a chief. The wahine who answered the phone said, 'There's a guy here who used to be on *Hawaii Five-O*.' I was driving to LA anyway to meet my family, so I said I'd go in and read for the part. They sent me the script and I thought, shoot, this is hot stuff.

"In Burbank, there was a room full of experienced Indian actors all waiting to try out. But they liked what I did and sent the director a videotape. Then I drove my Chevy truck to Vegas, where my dad was about to celebrate his 80th birthday.

Just as I walked in, the phone was ringing. The director wanted to see me, so it was back to Hollywood. They said they wanted me, but they had to check with the Haida consultant to see if it was OK for a Polynesian to play the role.

"The Haida are a Western coastal tribe, lots of fisherman. They visit Hawai'i in the winter. The consultant, whose name is Woody Morrison, said, 'I know Harrington. I go to his shows all the time in Hawai'i. He looks just like us, that buggah.'"

And that's how a Samoan raised in Hawai'i ended up playing a Haida Indian chief. For Harrington at 58, it's a new career. He has finished a TV movie role as a Navajo and just received a script that calls for him to play an Apache.

IN MEMORY YET GREEN

One of our new members, Philadelphian Alice Johnson, runs a fan club for the late silent film star John Gilbert. (By the way, the Post Office has a series of stamps out honoring silent stars, and one of them is John Gilbert. The stamps are renderings of Hirschfeld caricatures of each of the stars honored.) Alice publishes a newsletter chock full of information about the star, including input from his daughter, Leatrice Gilbert Fountain.

Alice sent me a sample of their newsletter. They had information about the stamps and the ceremony that announced them. Another article pointed out that Gilbert's talents and attributes as an actor have been largely ignored for decades, but now are beginning to be recognized. In another piece, Alice detailed her doomed struggle to open a club bank account (happily, Florida isn't as stinky as Philly evidently is about it). The newsletter ended with an absolutely tantalizing installment of a piece of fan fiction.

CHARACTER ACTOR ROYAL DANO

Colorado member Georgia Hiesterman reports seeing an item in her local newspaper marking the passing of character actor Royal Dano (Hody Linquist in "Paniolo"). The rangy actor had portrayed bad guys in countless westerns (he was my husband's particular favorite) and he'll be missed.

INVITATION TO MURDER

Episode 234 March 23, 1978 Production No. 0718 (Summary prepared by Reg Jones)

Attorney Malcolm Rhodes (Lyle Bettger) invites McGarrett to sit in on a reading of a will written by the deceased contemporary artist Addison Barlow. He does so because he believes the document is an invitation to murder. In it, Addison - who despised all of his heirs - says that his estate will go to whoever is still alive after one year. When the will is read, Addison's weak-willed sister Laura promptly topples over, dead from a poisoned pill mixed in with her aspirin.

McGarrett arranges to have the body of Addison Barlow and his recently deceased niece, Carolyn, exhumed. Surprise! Both had been given drugs that led to their untimely deaths. On top of that, McGArrett has noticed a painting that exactly matches one owned by a collector friend. A check on it (and the others hanging on the Barlow wall) reveals that all of them are fakes. The originals have been sold by a gallery owned by Benilea (Sydney Lassick). Although he has bills of sale signed by Addison Barlow, the signatures have been forged. It turns out that the paintings were done by Carolyn as part of a scheme dreamed up by Laura's sponging husband David Thorpe (Anthony Caruso) and carried out by Addison's gambler son Lawrence (Francis Kamahele).

Soon Lawrence dies when the car he borrowed from his sister Eugenie (Christina Kokubo) goes off a cliff. The car has been tampered with. But Eugenie must have been the intended victim, because in Lawrence's pocket are found a container of allergy pills, some of which are laced with poison. That's how he was supposed to die.

Who will be next? Worthless brother Thomas (Eduard Franz)? Cold wife Riah (Helen Funai)? Daughter Eugenie? Son-in-law David? Swarming over the Barlow house, Five-O discovers poison in Thomas's wine and on Riah's sewing needles. That leaves only Eugenie and David as the likely murderers. But it can't have been Eugenie. She hasn't even been in the house in a year.

Attention focuses on David as the likely villain. That is until it becomes clear that he couldn't have tampered with Eugenie's car. Then the penny drops for McGarrett. The real murderer is that vengeful old man Addison Barlow. He planned it all, even his own death, to get rid of the people he hated - and to leave David holding the bag.

NOTE: This was a rare **Hawaii Five-0** episode (the only one?) in which the puzzle wasn't solved until the last minute. Usually the guilty party or parties are known by us viewers, often from the opening scene.
