Daniel Kamekona, who had many roles in Hawaii Five-O from the first season right through to the last, was found dead in his Los Angeles apartment the end of April. He was 60 years old. Apparently he died in his sleep; foul play was ruled out. He had seemed previously, according to his son Leigh, to be in good health. According to a brief article in the Honolulu Advertiser, he had struggled for years to break into Hollywood, and finally succeeded with the role of Sato in Karate Kid II. Recently, he could be seen as Henry in the revival of Gene Barry's Burke's Law. In Hawaii, Kamekona had appeared in guest roles in Magnum, P.I., Jake and the Fatman, Island Son, and Tour of Duty.

Behind the Scenes

FIVE-O'S BOYS IN BLUE: THE REAL THING

Generally, when Hawaii Five-O was filming episodes in and around Honolulu, they hired anywhere from 15 to 20 officers per day. The officers provided security, crowd and traffic control, and, as a bonus, provided an atmosphere when a police presence was needed in a scene. I think I can safely say that any police officer in any scene of Hawaii Five-O (and later Magnum, P.I.) who did not have a speaking part was a genuine Honolulu Police Officer. We were paid the princely sum of \$10.00 an hour.

The Honolulu Police Department had, and still has, a program in place where senior officers purchased their own cars to be used as police vehicles. The City would equip their cars with a radio, blue light and siren and provide gas and insurance. The Officer was then free to utilize this vehicle, with the removable blue light, during special duty. So, when you see a police car in the show with the

bubblegum blue light, that is otherwise unmarked, you can rest assured that this is a genuine police vehicle. On the other hand, the blue and white police cars with the door shields belonged to CBS and they were kept stored at their Fort Ruger sound stage lot. While HPD had some marked units (we called them white cars) for prisoner transport, they were generally driven by rookies and could not be used by an off duty officer. CBS was careful to keep the lights on the unofficial police vehicles covered when the vehicles were being operated on the streets of Honolulu during filming of the program.

I worked a lot of Hawaii Five-O special duty but as well as I can remember, "Deadly Doubles" was the only episode in which I made it onto the screen. It was a truly enjoyable experience. Most of the indoor scene were filmed on a sound stage at Fort Ruger. This is a National Guard facility on the slopes of Diamond Head. I recall wandering around the sound stage and being astonished at the another than the studio went to to duplicate every type of environment imaginable.

During my first 3 years at HPD, I was assigned to work in the Waikiki district. You would not believe how many tourists asked me where Hawaii Five-O headquarters was located and how many surprised looks I got when I told them there was no real Five-O. A second frequently-asked question was the significance of the Five-O. I received many an embarrassed look when I had to point out the obvious fact that Hawaii was the fiftieth state.

[Editor's Note: Mr. Palmer became an HPD officer in January of 1975. He appeared in "Deadly Doubles" as the officer guarding the shower room; he can be seen escorting Borzov (Stefan Gierasch) out of the room. And his answer for the "Why Five-O?" question is the correct one.]

DAVID OPATOSHU

Members Paul Coyle and Reg Jones sent announcement of the passing of actor **David Opatoshu**, who had appeared as Shen Yu-Lan in "Face of the Dragon" and as Li Wing in "A Matter of Mutual Concern". He had been ill for some time. He was 78 years old. He began his acting career in Yiddish theater in New York, making his Broadway debut in 1936. He had a long list of television and film credits, as well as many theatrical appearances. He had also published in 1946 a collection of short stories written in Yiddish, and based on his World War II experiences in the South Pacific.

Unnoticed, a bearded frogman (Dale Roinette) disembarks from a submarine. Concurrently, a skin diver is shot dead on the beach by a young woman (Maude Adams) who then meets the frogman when he comes ashore. He fakes having the bends and is taken to a decompression chamber with his "wife." They give their names as Mr. and Mrs. Campini. Meanwhile, the body of the murdered man is discovered. He is LCDR Rizzo, one of two men being trained on a new missile system.

Released from the chamber. Campini is transferred to a military hospital, where all the Navy trainees are receiving their physicals. One of them is LCRD Harner (also played by Dale Robinette). McGarrett interviews him and neither can think of a reason why Rizzo should have been killed. Shortly after McGarrett leaves, Mrs. Campini enters Harner's room posing as a nurse and gives him a knockout shot. Campini shaves off his beard and takes Harner's place. The unconscious Harner is spirited away. The reason for Rizzo's death is now obvious. Only he would know that the double

was not the real Harner.

When "Harner" goes for his dental check, the dentist notes that he has stainless steel crowns, a material used by dentists trained in Moscow. "Harner" arranges for Mrs. Campini to kill the dentist, but not before he has sent a priority request for information to Washington. When the records arrive for the real Harner, they show no such crowns.

McGarrett is convinced that a switch has occurred, not only because of the sudden arrival of dental records (which provide a motive for the dentist's murder) but because "Harner" neither recognized him when they met again nor commented on Steve's change from 'civvies to uniform. McGarrett persuades the Admiral to intercept the man before he goes on the training ship. To McGarrett's surprise, this man's teeth match the dental record. The real Harner is back in place.

Concluding that Harner is under the influence of drugs and mind control, they track him to a rendezvous with Mrs. Campini and intercept him before the two meet. Steve takes his place and is able to get close to her before she realizes what has happened. She is captured, but not before her thugs have killed the fake Harner. They planned to leave his body behind in an effort to fool everyone into believing that the real Harner had been killed. In fact, the real Harner would have been taken aboard the sub.

NOTE: The two leads had no names, other than the phony ones of Mr. and Mrs. Campini. However, the end title credits listed Maude Adams as Maria Noble and Dale Robinette as Triskonis. A fine score was provided by Ernest Gold.
